

Steve was an enthusiastic collector of Mexican 20 Centavo coins and Lincoln cents. He was always a 'jack of all



Introduction to Modern Commemorative Coins by Jim Derrick

Early commemorative coins were minted by the U.S. Mint from 1892 – 1954. For these coin programs, sponsors petitioned the U.S. Congress for approval and then later marketed the coins produced by the U.S. Mint to support their programs. Sponsor organizations reaped the benefit of the coin sales. Due to problems with the program, it was ended in 1954.

In 1982 following a 28-year pause, the U.S. Congress authorized the "George Washington Commemorative Coin Program" to celebrate the 250th anniversary of his birth (pictured: 1982 D George Washington Comm. Half Dollar). This was the beginning of the Modern Commemorative Coin Program.





Since 1982, there have been 119 modern commemorative coin programs authorized by the U.S. Congress with coins produced or scheduled for future release by the U.S. Mint. Many of these programs include multiple denominations of minted coins.

Modern Commemorative Coin Programs are authorized by the U.S. Congress to honor a person, place, or event. The enabling legislation dictates the coins specification, mintages, cost considerations, and the surcharge amount to be collected. The Mint introduced the concept of a surcharge in 1984 with a certain amount designated to beneficiary organizations to help build new museums, maintain national monuments, preserve historical homes/sites, and support the Olympic Games.





The "1986 U.S. Statue of Liberty 100th Anniversary Commemorative Coin Program" has been the most successful modern commemorative coin program financially. Sales raised approximately 78 million dollars to support the statue and facilities (pictured: 1986 D Statue of Liberty Comm. Half Dollar).

There are several firsts for the US Mint and Modern Commemorative Coins. The "2010 Library of Congress \$10 Commemorative Gold Coin" is the first bimetallic coin produced by the Mint. It is 48% gold, 48% platinum and 4% other metals (pictured: 2010 \$10 PR70 DCAM).

(commemoratives from page 2) The "2019 Apollo 11 50th Anniversary Commemorative Coin" is the first U.S. Mint <u>5-oz.</u> uncirculated and Proof Silver Coin, which was given a \$1.00 denomination. It is also, the very first curved 5-ounce silver coin. (pictured coin shown in PF70DCAM).




No modern commemorative coins were authorized in

1985 and 2023. This year, there are two commemorative coin programs authorized and current-



ly in production. The "Harriet Tubman Bicentennial Commemorative Coin Program" recognizes the 200th anniversary of the birth of Harriet Tubman. It celebrates her life and legacy as a hero of freedom. The coins include the \$5 gold, \$1 silver, and half dollar clad coins (pictured, U.S. Mint Artistic Design for the \$5 Gold Coin Obverse). Also scheduled for minting this year is "The Greatest Generation Commemorative Coin Program", which commemorates the National World War II Memorial in Washington, D.C. The 3 coins in production are the same denominations

as above with designs that are emblematic of the National World War II Memorial and commemorate the service and sacrifice of American soldiers and civilians during World War II (pictured, U.S. Mint Artistic Design for the \$1.00 Silver Coin Obverse).


Important Meeting Announcement




