# The Fugio Cent by Jim Derrick

One of the most intriguing American coins is the "Fugio Cent". It is the VERY FIRST United States Coin authorized by Congress in 1787. The coin was authorized by the Continental Congress on April 21,1787 due to a heavy influx of counterfeit and lightweight copper coins, significantly affecting the economy at the time.



Our newly formed government, without a US Mint, contracted to have the coins made by Mr. James Jarvis, who owned a majority share in the Connecticut Mint. Congress was unaware that Mr. Jarvis had bribed Secretary of the Treasury, Mr. William Duer, with \$10,000 dollars to win the contract. The contract called for 345 tons of copper coins, equaling about 34,650,000 coins. However, only about 4 tons of copper coins were delivered by Mr. Jarvis, equaling about 400,000 coins being minted.



The 1787 Fugio Cent is believed to have been designed by Benjamin Franklin. This is based on Franklin's early coin drawings (shown at left) for a 1776 Continental Currency Coin, which is almost identical to the Fugio Cent. The term Fugio is Latin for "I Flee". Used in context with the obverse coin design, the term "Fugio" refers to "Time Flies".

The obverse coin design shows a meridian sun shining down on a dial (Sun Dial) with the hours expressed. On the left obverse side is the word "Fugio" and on the right side is the date, "1787". Below the Dial are the words "Mind Your Business" referring Americans to focus on their business affairs much like Benjamin Franklin did. Cinquefoils, which are a 5 lobed rosette device (shown right), may also be on the obverse in 4 loca-



tions, but not on every coin. Also, some coins may have only a cross below the date on the obverse, instead of the cinquefoils. (continued page 2)

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*(Fugio continued)* Along with the words "Fugio" and "Mind Your Business." One could infer that Franklin is telling all people to focus on your life and business and to use your time wisely.

The reverse of the coin shows thirteen inter-linked circles representing the Colonies that formed the United States. There is a small circle in the middle with the words "United States" around it. In the center of the circle are the words "We Are One". There is no denomination on the Fugio one-cent coin. The mass is 10.2 grams (157.41 grains). The coin metal is 100% copper. The University of Notre Dame estimates the mintage of about 400,000 Fugio coins were made.



The dies of the Fugio Cent were engraved by Die Maker, Mr. Abel Buell. There are 55 different varieties of the Fugio Cent with 24 Obverse Dies and 33 reverse dies. There are three main groups of Fugio's which are based on the Sun's Rays: Standard Fine or Pointed, Club Ray with round or convex end, and Club Rays with concave shape (rarest type).

Fugio Cents are still available for purchase but can be quite pricey. Examples of very fine coins go for upwards of \$2,000 or more. Good examples are less expensive but may be very worn. A restrike of the Fugio Cent, that was not authorized by the U.S. Congress or Treasury, was manufactured in 1857 at the Scovill Mint in Waterbury, Connecticut. These coins, which are estimated at 300-400 total, were minted from newly made dies in 1857.

The Bank of New York, which started in 1764, acquired a full keg of Fugio Coins in 1788 after they were minted. These are referred to as the Bank of New York Hoard. These lay dormant at the bank until 1856. They were then placed in cotton bags and re-stored and forgotten. Rediscovered again in 1926, some coins were sold by the Bank to favored customers and officials. In 1948, the American Numismatic Society (ANS) examined the remaining 1,641 Fugio Coins. Some Coins were donated to the ANS and others were sold. Currently, there are 819 coins that remain in the Bank of New York.

# Walking Liberty Half Dollar

Our November meeting saw Rex Borders educating the membership on the Walking Liberty half dollar. The coinage act of 1890 specified that coin designs could only be changed every 25 years. The Commission of Fine Arts held a design competition in 1915 to replace the "Barber" coinage (10c, 25c, 50c) in circulation since 1892. Adolph Weinman won the designs for the

dime and half dollar.

The figure of Lady Liberty clothed in the American flag is considered one of the most beautiful US coin designs. This coin was produced from 1916 to 1947. Production across the years was irregular with production numbers ranging from 208,000 to 53,190,000. There were several years in which no half dollars were produced.

The obverse design was later chosen to be obverse of the US Silver Eagle in 1986 to present, and is still in production today.


