"Then conquer we must, when our cause it is just, and this be our motto -In God Our Trust."

These words were written by Francis Scott Key in 1814 and appear in the 4th stanza of the poem "Defense of Fort M'Henry". Our National Anthem, the Star Spangled Banner's lyrics are based on this poem.

In God We Trust

Prior to the Civil War there was a movement to include these words on our nations's coinage. One such idea was produced as a pattern for the \$10 Gold piece. This shows "IN GOD OUR TRUST" in the banner over the eagle on the reverse.


The expansion of religious sentiment during the Civil War reached a point where the nation demanded the motto's addition to our coinage. The "IN GOD WE TRUST" motto first appeared on the U.S. 2-cent coin in 1864, the wording having been modified by the Secretary of the Treasury. The 1864 coin has two varieties of this motto, as illustrated at left. An 1868 certified example is displayed here.

hower signed into law (Public Law 84-140) a bill declaring "In God We Trust" as the nation's official motto. Congress further mandated that the phrase be printed on every denomination of U.S. currency. (continued page 2)

The appearance of the "In God We Trust" motto on currency came much later. In 1956, President Eisen-

## Aleksander (Alex) Dimitrov

I enjoy introducing interesting club members to our readers every month. Alex Dimitrov was born and raised in Bulgaria at the time when the country was part of the Eastern Block and communism was the political system in the country. Alex attended the Technical University in the capital city of Sofia with a major in Industrial Design; he wanted to work in the auto industry designing automobiles. Regardless of these ambitions, he "always looked up to the United States as the greatest and best country to live in, so when I was 21, I moved to the US."

Alex arrived in the US without knowing anybody and had nothing. Like most immigrants, he started working in the construction industry and slowly got into the plumbing trade. After years of working for another company, he decided to start his own small plumbing business which has been his main occupation for the last 18 years or so.



His interest in numismatics stemmed from hisinterest in precious metals. As a crossroad between the East and the West Bulgaria always had hidden treasures from the Roman, Byzantine and Ottoman Empires and it wasn't unusual for people to find ancient coins buried in the ground. Some of the world's oldest gold artifacts were found in Bulgaria making it a part of the local culture. In current times, the irresponsible monetary policy and constant money printing made Alex think of the hyper-inflation and currency devaluation he had witnessed as a growing kid in Bulgaria. Metals seemed a logical safe haven and a piece of mind in future turbulent times. He started to appreciate the beauty and history behind some of the coins he acquired, and he slowly got into the world of numismatics.

Alex primarily collects Mexican Libertad, Morgan dollars, and Bulgarian silver coins. His goal is to learn more about the older US coinage and hopefully expand his collection in the future. Numismatics has become one of his passions in addition to soccer, cars, horology (the science of measuring time). He is also interested in traditional investments like stocks and real estate, and hopes to establish a portfolio of investment properties in the next 10-15 years as a way to support his retirement.

# **Pre-War US Proof Sets**

Our January meeting saw Scott Bucholtz educating our members on Pre-War Proof Sets. Individual "proof" coins were produced from 1858 to 1915; they were "shiny" specimens produced without special preparation. Production of these individual coins were eliminated in World War I.

During the great depression, FDR promoted coin collecting as "a good hobby."

"Proof sets" were produced starting in 1936 using coins produced using the proof minting method: highly polished dies, sharper rims and designs, smoother fields and sometimes chemical treatment to enhance the finish. The initial pricing for these early sets was \$1.89 (91¢ face value of coins plus a 98¢ premium with shipping). The number of sets produced in a given year were limited by the smallest mintage of set coins produced.



Proof set production stopped in 1942 for several reasons. These included the manufacturing priority for World War II, the need for more circulation coinage for increasing commerce, and the mint's tasking to produce medals for servicemen.

The month of January saw deposits of \$2,846.61 from member renewals and Spring Show fees. Our expenses totaled \$11,889.06. This is due to our purchase of 37 brand new show cases, deposits for the Fall Show venue, the Club picnic in May, and payment for the Trade Fair venue. Along with the show comes advertising fees and the remainder of costs were routine supplies. Our closing Bank amount was \$27,859.59. 
