Two Tricky Half Dollar Sets by Scott Bucholtz

Last year, I completed what I dub the "Obtainable" US Type Set which is a type set of US Coins that I could reasonably afford. I decided it would be a fun challenge to try and complete date and mint mark sets of specific types of older US regular strike coins. However, two half dollar sub-type sets have really spoken to me and presented some fun challenges as a numismatist.

The first is Capped Bust Reeded Edge Half Dollars which are actually two distinct types unto themselves. The Type 2 is distinguished by the legend "50 CENTS" on the bottom of the reverse whereas the Type 3 coins were updated to say "HALF

DOL." Each of these sub-types were only minted for 2 years (Type 2, 1836-1837 and Type 3, 1838-1839). For US Type collectors, the 1837 is readily available and reasonably priced. However, the 1836 Capped Bust, Reeded Edge Half Dollar boasts a mintage of a mere 5,000 coins and an estimated survival of approximately 1,000. Even in low grades, this coin sells for thousands of dollars so it was clear I would need to acquire a slabbed, certified example. I was able to win a PCGS-certified example in Fine, Detail grade. On the Type 3, "HALF DOL.", the challeng-



ing coin is the 1839-O. Not only is this the only Capped Bust Half Dollar made outside of Philadelphia, it is also nearly 10 times rarer than the 1838 Capped Bust Half Dollar. This coin features an additional, unique footnote as the only half dollar made at the New Orleans mint with the mint mark on the obverse. Rumor has it that this was done as a "mark of pride" on their first larger diameter production run in silver.

The other tricky half dollar sub-type complete set that posed a real collecting challenge was the Seated Liberty With Motto, Arrows at Date (Type 6) Half Dollars. With only 6 coins in this sub-type set (produced by the US Mint from 1873-1874), it may not seem too difficult a hill to climb. However, when you get into the nitty-gritty of this Type 6 collection, I realized the mints are the key. For both years, the lion share of the production was coined at The Philadelphia Mint. Survival estimates from 2,500 and 3,000 respectively make these *(continued page 2)*

(*Tricky Halfs from page 1*) "no mint mark" examples a straight-forward acquisition. The San Francisco mint 1873-S (survival estimate of 350) and 1874-S (survival esti-

mate of 500) would easily make them key dates in almost any other set. However, as per usual, the Carson City mint takes the cake here. The 1873-CC Seated Liberty Half Dollar has an estimated survival of a mere 250 specimens. This alone would be daunting but the 1874-CC was only minted to the tune of 59,000 pieces so its sur-



vival estimate of 180 total coins is not surprising at all! These two S and two CC examples took me more than a year to acquire in the G to VF range.

All-in-all, I am having great fun working on the challenge of subtype complete sets. It is a great way to expand your knowledge of a coin type that collectors might otherwise simply acquire a single example of and move on.

Boy Scout Coin Merit Badge

On July 29th, Peter Rechkemmer, the Young Numismatist's Coordinator, met with eleven scouts from Albuquerque's Boy Scout Troop One to discuss coin collecting. They discussed the requirements for earning the Coin Collecting Merit Badge, including handling, storing, collecting, and different types of coins. One Boy Scout brought in his inherited collection from his grandfather, which included a complete wheat cent collection.

Each Boy Scout must complete ten tasks to earn the merit badge. To assist them, the Albuquerque Coin Club provided them with the following materials to get started:

- Whitman Coin Collecting Merit badge Coin Folder
- Task booklet explaining each task
- Worksheet booklet
- Instructions booklet to help them with their tasks To complete four of the ten tasks, they received:
- Five different state quarters for the commemorative quarter task.
- A Lincoln Cent, a Jefferson Nickel, a Roosevelt Dime, a Washington Quarter, a Kennedy Half Dollar, and a Sacagawea Dollar for their type set task.
- A copy of the *Numismatist, Coin World*, and a copy of the ACC's *Pocket Change* for the reading task.
- For the foreign coin task a coin hunt where each Boy Scout had to select twenty foreign coins and identify their countries of origin.

They also received coin show flyers, information about the A's for Coins program, the ABQ YN program, and details about the club. The troop was provided with a *Red Book* to aid in coin identification and a 63-page pamphlet containing information about the coin collecting merit badge.


Our July meeting was well attended with 51 people including several YNs. There

were 5 Zoom participants included. Thanks to Byron Kesner who presented Collecting Coins Thematically. He talked about bringing common themes together to make a collection, being buildings, animals, or anything of interest. Coins of certain metals, shapes, or colors can be a theme as well.

State Fair - 2025 NM State Fair will soon be upon us. We need displays and volunteers. Tom Stone and Byron Kesner are coordinating these, respectively. The Albuquerque Coin Club has had a long association with the NM State Fair. We set up displays, provide club information, and give away free coins in the Creative Arts Building. Historically we have done well in attracting new members from the general public. We encourage members to enter a display at the fair. The rules for these are spelled out in document that can be found on the state fair website. The

club sets up 30 cases at the Fair. You can enter a display competitively, where it will be judged by 3 volunteer judges, or non-competitively just for fun. 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place ribbons are awarded to each of the eight classes. As you may know, we ask people to vote for their favorite display and then allow them a free coin from the treasure chest. A special ribbon is awarded to the display receiving the most votes. A Best of Show ribbon is awarded in each section (Youth, Adult, Professional) and finally a Special Grand Award for the best judged display is awarded. These displays are what attracts visitors to our area.

Fall Coin Show - The Fall Coin Show will be at the Crowne Plaza Nov 7-9. Plans are well underway for an exciting show. The club is planning on renting a bill board right outside the hotel. Ed Deye has been working hard on getting this in place. A special shout-out to Eddie Tudor Coins in Rio Rancho for contributing to our advertising budget for both radio and the billboard.

We had deposits totaling \$2,630.34 from table fees, memberships, and a refund for the display case locks that we replaced. Our expenses totaled \$2,160.84 for show advertising, storage rental, and website updating. We also transferred \$25,000.00 to our Vanguard account bringing that amount up to \$56,847.56. Our closing checking account stood at \$38,088.12. Our total monetary net worth for July was \$94,935.68.
