Cameo, Cameo, Cameo By Jim Derrick

Deep/Ultra Cameo coins are the standard for Proof Coins made today by the U.S. Mint. Cameo refers to the strong contrast between the frosted devices (design elements on the obverse and reverse), and the mirror-like, smooth background (fields) on a proof coin. The contrast portrayed in newly minted proofs are stunning for eye appeal and value.

Today's Cameos are made by using specially prepared **polished planchets** that are flawless in appearance before striking. Since 2013, **coin dies** have been specially prepared by the Mint using modern polishing


technology to create intensely brilliant and mirror-like surfaces. The surface of the die is frosted with computer-controlled laser-etching, with varying degrees of contrast. The polished planchets are hand-fed into the modern coin press and struck multiple times under extremely high pressure. The creation is a beautiful proof coin with nearly perfect mirrored fields and raised cameo frosted design elements. The Mint inspects finished Proofs by hand and encapsulates the coin in a protective capsule and special packaging.

Both the **Numismatic Guaranty Corporation (NGC) and the Professional Coin Grading Service (PCGS)** have adopted grading standards for Cameo Coins. These standards differ somewhat in the names and abbreviations but are very similar for grading.

For PCGS, there are three (3) standards for giving proof coins a **Cameo Strike Designation**, including **Proof (PF/PR,** with none or little cameo appearance, and more brilliant uncirculated, **Deep Cameo (DCAM**, the highest level of cameo contrast on both the obverse and reverse), and **Cameo (CAM**, with not enough frosting to qualify for DCAM). *(continued page 2)*

Dave Frank Numismatic Warrior


I get to meet many interesting people in my travels around the country. It is my pleasure to introduce



Three Cent Pieces

Our August meeting saw Scott Bucholtz instructing the membership on 3 cent coinage. Initially authorized by the postage act of 1851, these coins with a low silver content were intended for the public to buy stamps. The Philadelphia mint produced these coins (with the exception of 1851 where some were made in New Orleans) from 1851 to 1873. They were produced in three design types: Type I from 1851 to 1853 having an obverse star with no outline, Type II from 1854 to 1858 with two lines bordering the star, and Type III from 1859 to 1873 with a one-line border around the star.

A copper-nickel alloy 3 cent coin was introduced in 1865 to further reduce the amount of silver in coinage. This coin was continued until 1889; there was no real demand for it in the later years.










The Coin Cabinet

About three years ago, the ACC received a very valued and treasured coin donation from long time member, **Mr. Dick Kisluk (pictured)**. Dick passed away on September 13, 2022.



The Kisluk Donation was appraised by several member Numismatists from the Club using current price guides. A Donations Committee was established to manage the donated coins. Based on their recommendations and the approval of the Board of Directors, the most valued part of the Kisluk Donation is now a permanent collection of the Albuquerque Coin Club. The Kisluk Permanent Collection includes Early American Dollars from



1795-1803, Trade Dollars from 1873-1883, and a complete Peace Dollar Collection from 1921-1935.

All of the Kisluk Permanent Collection Coins have been submitted to either NGC (Numismatic Guaranty Corporation) or ANACS (American Numismatics Association Certification Service) for conservation, certification, and encapsulation, to protect the coins and ensure their longevity. To raise funds for the Club, the Board has authorized the sale of assorted gold and silver coins over the past two years. These coins were auctioned at Club Shows, Membership Meeting Auctions, and at National Auctions. Many of our members have been able to participate in the auction sales and acquire some of the coins donated by Mr. Kisluk. There are only a few coins that remain that are not part of the Kisluk Permanent Collection, and these may be available in the future.

The Kisluk Donation was originally appraised at about \$180,000 dollars. A part of the collection is maintained as a Permanent Collection, and is stored in the Club's Bank Safety Deposit Box and removed for display only at Club Shows and special events. Funds generated through auction sales raised about \$66,830 dollars over the past two years. Some of the funds raised by the ACC Auction Sales have been authorized to upgrade the Club's equipment and supplies, including purchasing 86 new display cases, 56 new tables, and a state-of-the-art security system we use at Club coin shows. The remainder of the funds raised have been placed in our Club's bank or savings accounts. These funds will continue to be managed by the ACC Board of Directors and may be used over time to support our Club operations and our mission of numismatic education.

The Kisluk Permanent Collection will be available for viewing at the upcoming Fall 2025 Great SW Coin Expo, scheduled for November 7-9, 2025, at the Crowne Plaza Hotel. We will continue to remember Dick Kisluk for his great donation to the ACC. One of our members who knew Dick recently said that although he did not show it outwardly, he was a kind, generous and caring man. Thank you very much Dick.
