Writers Wanted

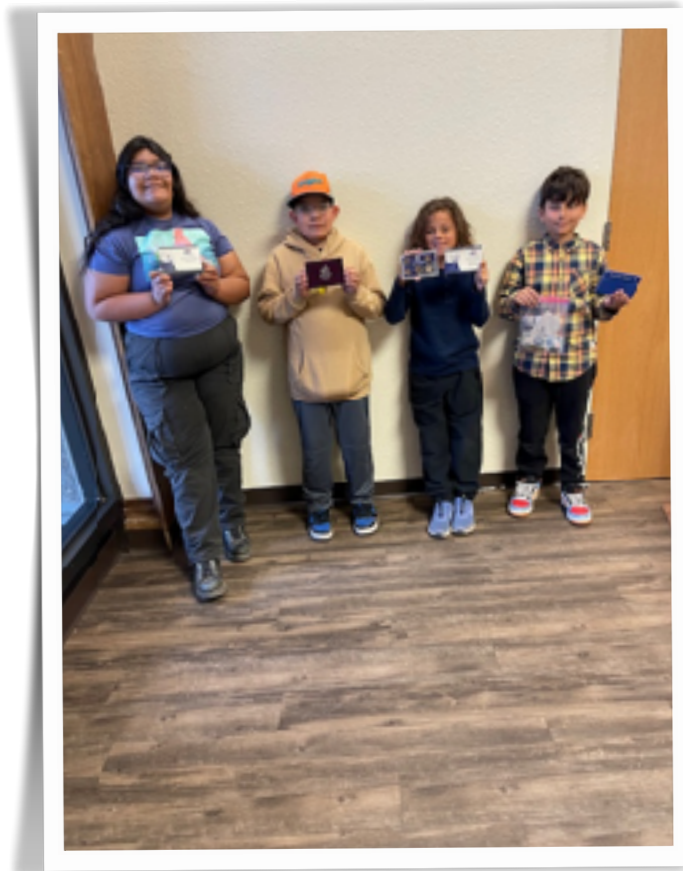

Who is PANS? The Polish American Numismatic Society (a Non-Profit Numismatic Society) was founded in November of 1981. It is a non-profit Educational Numismatic Society dedicated to preserving Polish History and Culture through Collecting Polish Coins, Medals, Paper Money, and other numismatic related items. Did you know?

The official currency of Poland is the Zloty, which is subdivided into 100 Grosz. The current monetary system has been in place since the 1995. Featuring nine standard denominations: 1, 2, 5, 10, 20, and 50 groszy; as well as 1, 2, and 5 złotych



Current Circulation Coins

- **Grosz Coins (Higher Value):** 10 gr, 20 gr, 50 gr, 1 złoty (made from copper-nickel or copper and nickel-plated steel.)
- **Złoty Coins:** 1 zł, 2 zł, 5 zł.
- **Design:** All coins feature the Polish eagle (their state emblem), the year of issue, and the inscription *RZECZPOSPOLITA POLSKA*.
- **Material:** 2 złoty coins are bimetallic (cupronickel and aluminum bronze), while 5 złoty coins feature a bimetallic structure of aluminum bronze and copper-nickel.
